the shock due to this war has been severe to the whole Palestinian economy and not only to Gaza.










On top of the immediate humanitarian catastrophe, we see unfolding; there is also a **development crisis**.

ALMOST 1.5 MILLION PEOPLE IN GAZA INTERNALLY DISPLACED SINCE THE BEGINNING OF THE WAR

THERE IS LARGE-SCALE DESTRUCTION, ESPECIALLY OF THE HOUSING UNITS.

THE ASSESSMENT PREDICTS THAT THE ESTIMATED ECONOMIC DOWNTURN WILL



The humanitarian system in Gaza is on the edge of collapse and each day this war continues, the ripple effect on neighbouring counties in the Arab States region will have lasting socioeconomic setbacks.








3-month Scenario 230,000 will fall into poverty by end 2023

6-month Scenario
Over 500,000 will fall
into poverty in 2024



Due to the effects of reduced tourism activities, and other changes in the economy, such as those affecting investment, productivity and trade, the combine GDP will sustain losses.







3-month Scenario Aggregate Loss US\$ 10.3 billion = -2.3%

6-month Scenario
Aggregate Loss
US\$ 18.0 billion
= -4.0%









The crisis hit at a time when all three countries have limited policy space to address it impacts, because of pre-existing structural gaps and more recent impacts (including from COVID-19 and the Ukraine war).

SO FAR, THE REGIONAL EFFECTS HAVE LARGELY BEEN CONTAINED BUT ARE BIG ENOUGH DURING SUCH A SHORT PERIOD OF TIME TO PROVIDE GROUNDS FOR CONCERN.

UNLESS THE WAR ENDS SOON, THE SPILLOVER EFFECTS ON THE STATE OF PALESTINE'S IMMEDIATE NEIGHBORS CAN BE SIGNIFICANT

IF THE GEOGRAPHIC SCOPE OF THE WAR EXPANDS THE MAGNITUDE OF THE IMPACT WILL RISE EXPONENTIALLY.

SHORT-TERM EFFECTS CAN HAVE LONG LASTING IMPACTS.

Localized and gender-responsive livelihood restoration for most affected



Immediate and gender-responsive legal aid to individuals impacted by the conflict
