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CHINA: EXCHANGE OF CORRESPONDENCE

Doar Pierre,

I am writing to share with you some of the losights inf the Economics and Security Committee gained during our recent vieit to Chical the Fish over thy an Assembly delegation. The visit was a great success and reinforced our sense that China's explosive economic growth poses economic and security challenges to the Atlance and its members violation, an wolf as a range of opportunities.

We write well received by our hosts, and t was clear that the officials we mat were pleased that we had decided to visit. We received a very clear message that the Ohmess want to engage in a diategue with members of the Assembly. They are clearly interested in further contacts with the Assembly perhaps as a parallel to initial contacts that have been each short with NATO.

Wong these lines, the officers of the Committee who travelled to Beprig and Shanghai concluded, that:

- 1 The NATO Padiamentary Assembly should signal its willingness to continue 0 elicitingue. We believe the Standing Committee should a souse offening a more formal status to the Chinese People's Congress. In the meantime, we would recommend that, as President, you invite a decouption to attend the Copenhagen Sess on as padiamentary guests.
- 2. The decision to focus our Committee's abention on China was a conditione. Our draft report will be unrended to take account of what we learnil from this visit. China is a large and complex society and it is not clear (even to the Chinose loadboship, I augpect) where their modern sation will lead, indeed, our modilings raised more questions than answers. In view of this, we balleve our committee should refain a focus on China next year and, we plan, with Standing Committee automastion, to visit the country again to discover what is happening away from the argumentary cilies. Fixe Beijing and Shanghat, A format proposal to do so will be made to the Standing Committee in due range.

Dear Hugh,

I have read your letter of 13 September last with great interest, and I thank you for informing me of the findings of your mission to China and of the prospects of future work for our Parliamentary Assembly. As you point out, the growth of the Chinese economy and the thirst of the Chinese leadership for power represent a real challenge for the member-countries of the Atlantic Alliance.

I agree with the findings of the members of your sub-committee on the necessity for initiating relations between our Assembly and the Chinese authorities. However, having regard to the strategic implications of the emergence of China, the sensitivity of certain national delegations in respect of arms sales and technology transfers as well as the security of Taiwan, I cannot invite a delegation from the People's Assembly to Copenhagen next November on my initiative alone, without consulting the members of the Bureau and the Standing Committee beforehand. I will ask the International Secretariat to put this question on the agenda for the next meetings of these two bodies, because in my view we should obtain the broadest possible consensus on both the principle and the methods of a dialogue with that country.

I have given your other proposals my full consideration, but their implementation seems to depend, as you yourself point out, on broad political agreement within our Assembly. I will submit these also to the members of the Bureau and the Standing Committee.
