Dear Christian:

With avian flu on the brink of becoming a pandemic, Nature seems to be teaching the world one more lesson — be well-prepared or it will suffer catastrophic consequences.

Taking its cue from the warning, Taiwan would like to once again stress the utmost importance of leaving no loopholes in the world health network formed by the WHO. After the 2003 outbreak of SARS, Taiwan and several other countries were severely buffeted in terms of both human and financial losses. The world must act decisively not to allow any similar pandemic get out of hand.

As a country most likely to be struck by such a disaster, Taiwan once again urges all countries to act to ensure including Taiwan in the WHO system in a seamless manner and in the interests of all countries because:

- 1. Taiwan is one of the most important transportation hubs in the west Pacific.
- 2. Taiwan has massive human and goods exchanges with China and Southeast Asia, which have registered many bird flu cases.
- 3. Taiwan is a major transit point for migratory birds.
- 4. Taiwan has no access to the WHO's global disease prevention and control network.
- 5. Viruses know no boundaries.
- 6. Taiwan is able and ready to contribute to the WHO system in terms of expertise, experience and resources.

- 1. The WHO member states are urged to support Taiwan's full participation in the WHO system based upon human rights, humanitarianism and universal participation in fighting global diseases.
- 2. The WHO should exchange letters with Taiwan to provide guidelines for Taiwan's meaningful participation in the WHO system and the IHR mechanism.
- 3. Taiwan should be accorded full and institutionalized access to global disease prevention and control mechanisms like the Global Outbreak Alert and Response Network (GOARN), the Global Influenza Program (GIP) and the International Partnership on Avian and Pandemic Influenza (IPAPI).
- 4. Taiwan should be invited to attend member-states-based meetings as an observer in addition to experts-based technical meetings.
- 5. The WHO should accept Taiwan in the IHR mechanism as a "participating party" and treat Taiwan's Center for Disease Control as an IHR focal point.
- 6. The WHO and its members are urged to respond creatively and positively to Taiwan's request for participation in the WHA as a "health entity" in an observer capacity.

On behalf of my government, I have the honor of urging you to act on Taiwan's request so that all countries may be better protected and of thanking you for any action you may take in this regard.
