THE DEDI SUMMER SCHOOL is has brought together 19 young participants from the political, intellectual and creative arenas belonging to the identified Arab countries, along with five Danish participants, for innovative workshops and networking opportunities, from May 25 to June 4. The themes covered have included the history and future of welfare society, innovation in education, the role of political institutions at local, national and supranational levels, leadership and civic reform, climate change and environment, the power of art, human rights and security.

On June 4 the participants will host a dialogue with organizations (especially the DAI partners; MS-actionaid, KVINFO, DUF, IMS) and persons interested in reform in the Arab world based on the experiences and reflections from the DEDI Summer School 2010. The program will focus on issues of reform; mainstreaming of reform issues; connections between the Arab countries and European / Danish contexts.
