I am writing to remind you about the international parliamentary forum on renewable energy and development which will be held by the Climate Parliament on **March 7th** - **8th**, **2013**. Please find a draft programme attached.

The meeting will be held at the European Parliament in Brussels. It will convene Members of Parliament from Africa, Asia and Europe in an urgent dialogue with major multilateral agencies on international cooperation to promote renewables world-wide.

Confirmed speakers so far include:

- Philippe Benoit, Head of Energy Efficiency and Environment, International Energy Agency;

- Rintaro Tamaki, Deputy Secretary-General for Environment, Development, Green Growth and Financial Affairs at the OECD;
- Josué Tanaka, Managing Director for Climate Change & Energy Efficiency, European Bank of Reconstruction & Development
- Mark Radka, Head of Energy, United Nations Environment Programme

Scientists tell us that the transition from fossil fuels to renewable energy is happening too slowly to prevent changes in our climate that will reduce our food supply, threaten our coastal cities and lead to increasingly frequent extreme weather events such as the droughts and storms we saw last year. The transition to renewable energy requires close cooperation at both regional and global levels. Members of Parliament have a key role in generating international action at the speed and scale needed.

Meanwhile, international organisations such as the regional development banks, the European Union, UN agencies and the World Bank are investing vast sums of money in infrastructure. But are they doing enough to promote clean energy? As legislators, we approve the budgets that fund their work. Members of Parliament from both donor and recipient countries need to monitor the work of those organisations on behalf of our constituents. MPs can encourage them to give top priority to accelerating the global transition to a low carbon economy.

There are many areas where action is needed from international institutions. To create a reliable supply of clean energy, the nations of each major world region must share their resources among themselves through cross-border trading. In this way, everyone can be connected to the areas where solar, wind, hydro and other renewable energy sources are most abundant, and local fluctuations in sun and wind can be smoothed out. This requires a new level of international cooperation on energy issues.

In the global sunbelt, where most of the world's poor majority lives, bilateral and multilateral development agencies have an important role to play in enabling access to clean energy for everyone.

This Climate Parliament Forum will enable legislators to question agency heads and senior officials from the African Development Bank, the Asian Development Bank, the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development, the European Commission, the European Investment Bank, the International Energy Agency, the International Renewable Energy Agency, the OECD, the UN Development Programme, the UN Industrial Development Organisation, the World Bank and some major bilateral agencies about what they are doing – or not doing – to support renewable energy. Part of the discussion will include MPs from all three regions, and part will take place in regional groups.

The Climate Parliament will be happy to cover the costs of your airfare and accommodation. There will be simultaneous interpretation between Chinese, English and French.
