Jorn - a couple of thoughts from my staff:

1. Marked solos are not individual issue here and the standing instruction is that suspension settings are not to be adjusted from manufacturer's standard. Maximum usage and minimum costs without permanent motorcyclists is the basis of our system.

Surveillance solos tend to be individual but there is always the issue of pool bikes to cover for maintenance and repair.

2. The Metropolitan Police Service for as long as I can remember have always had shared bikes. I cannot see what the safety issue would be.

Any rider should complete a daily inspection and as such should find any faults or adjust items that can be to suit them, e.g. Seat height, lever span etc.

Some UK forces will have personal issue bikes but that I should imagine is because they have a small number of trained riders so can give personal issue.

Personal issue is beneficial in keeping bikes clean but I do not believe there is a safety issue in a bike having multiple riders.
