1. General introduction

The period of implementation of "The Stockholm Programme - an open and secure Europe serving and protecting citizens" will end by 2014 and discussions as to the post-Stockholm agenda for the Area of Freedom, Security and Justice are currently taking place.

Following the Meeting of the Chairpersons of the Committees on Justice and Home Affairs of EU Parliaments, which was held in Athens on February 17, 2014 this joint committee meeting is intended to provide a forum for the exchange of views on the future priorities on the basis of the progress made under the Stockholm Programme. As such it should contribute to the definition of parliamentary priorities ahead of the June 2014 European Council which plans to define strategic guidelines for legislative and operational planning in the area of freedom, security and justice (pursuant to Article 68 TFEU). In this context it will also provide the occasion to assess the two communications - one on home affairs and one on justice affairs - that the Commission intends to present by spring 2014.

The Lisbon Treaty offers enhanced possibilities of involving national Parliaments in the legislative and other work undertaken in the field of civil liberties, justice and home affairs, notably by reference to Articles 69, 70, 71 and 85 TFEU, as well as the Protocol No 1 on the role of national Parliaments in the European Union.

What future for Europol?

The fight against cross-border serious and organised crime can only be carried out effectively in the EU through close cooperation between national law enforcement authorities. Amongst the different cooperation and information exchange mechanisms, Europol plays a central role as an information hub. In March 2013, the Commission proposed a new legal framework for Europol¹, making the agency more flexible in processing information, with more rigorous data protection requirements, and placed it under the clear parliamentary scrutiny of the European Parliament together with national Parliaments. In February 2014, the European Parliament adopted its position on the proposed Europol Regulation², strengthening the data protection safeguards, spelling out in greater detail the joint parliamentary scrutiny by the European Parliament and the national Parliaments, rejecting the proposed merger between Europol and CEPOL, and clarifying the cooperation and exchange of information between Member States, third countries and Europol.

How to deal with the on-going crisis in the Mediterranean?

Following the tragic events off Lampedusa, a Task Force Mediterranean has been set up, which, according to the relevant Commission Communication aims at an integrated approach regarding migratory flows in the Mediterranean, focusing on cooperation with third countries, regional protection, resettlement and reinforced legal avenues to Europe, fighting against trafficking, smuggling and organised crime, reinforced border surveillance, and finally assistance and solidarity with Member States dealing with high migration pressure. The European Parliament in a Resolution adopted in October 2013¹ welcomed the intention to establish the Task Force. In legislative terms an important step was the agreement reached on the draft Regulation establishing rules for the surveillance of the external sea borders in the context of operational cooperation coordinated by Frontex at the External Borders of the Members States.

eraReinforcing data protection and shielding EU citizens against
electronic mass surveillance

At the beginning of 2012 the Commission had presented the proposals of the data protection package consisting of a draft Regulation¹ and a draft Directive². The LIBE committee voted its position and a mandate to enter into negotiations with the Council in view of a first reading agreement on 21 October 2013³. Negotiations could, however, not yet start as Member States in Council could not yet agree on a position.

The European Parliament resolution of 4 July 2013 on the US National Security Agency surveillance programme, surveillance bodies in various Member States and their impact on EU citizens' privacy mandated the LIBE Committee to conduct an in-depth inquiry into the matter also in collaboration with national parliaments. The work of the inquiry led to a number of recommendations and the session could serve to discuss parliamentary priorities of the coming years in this field.

17.30 - 18.25 SESSION IV - Developing a criminal justice area under the Lisbon Treaty with regard to the European Public Prosecutor's Office Judicial cooperation in criminal matters

In July 2013 the Commission presented a new draft Regulation on the European Public Prosecutor's Office (EPPO)¹, and a draft Regulation on Eurojust², the two being closely linked. According to the Commission, the creation of EPPO aims at an enhanced fight against crime affecting the EU budget, and thus savings millions of euros at times of fiscal consolidation. National Parliaments have, through their reasoned opinions, raised a 'yellow card' to this Commission proposal at the end of 2013, the Commission has, however, decided not to withdraw the proposal. Since Art. 86 TFEU, the legal basis for the EPPO Regulation, provides for a special legislative procedure with the consent of the European Parliament only at the end of the negotiations in the Council, the Parliament has decided to draw up an interim report containing recommendations for modification of the proposal which is currently under way. As to the draft Eurojust Regulation, it aims to make the functioning of Eurojust more efficient and apt to its important mission, including by clarifying its competences and structure, powers of national members, relations with the EPPO, as well as its democratic oversight.
