- Nordic countries work actively to support peaceful status quo





Regional politics focus on Arctic oceans

- Etc.


No Arctic great game for resources





Reserves in Russian Arctic (estimate)




- Policies that emphasize maintaining communication, transparency, common diplomatic and governance activities
- Further economic development through capacity-building and regional cooperation







Few security interests. Mainly low politics interests instead:

- Economic development
- Environmental protection
- Minority interests



Norway

- Avoid territorial threat from Russia
- Protect economic interests (energy, fish stocks)
- Participate in development of Russian Arctic
- Maintain current Arctic order
